Good job, Jordon! Way to represent the Bulldogs!






Tobey Kids Learn the Art of Speed Stacking

Students in Tatum Odell's Physical Education classes at Tobey Elementary got a special visit from an athlete in a unique sport- cup stacking.

Mr. Tim Bell is a retired PE teacher from Gull Lake and was recruited to work for a company called Speed Stacks to go around and introduce cup stacking to Michigan schools that are interested. He competes in the junior olympics at the senior cup stacking level and is the fastest in his age group!

Mr. Bell spent a day with all of the PE classes at Tobey as they played games and taught the kids cup stacking.









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Sunset Lake Learns About Visual Impairment

Students in Chelsea Freund's second grade class at Sunset Lake Elementary recently got to learn what it's like to be visually impaired.

The second graders just learned about Helen Keller and they were very interested in her story and how she overcame the challenges in her life.

Elementary Multilingual Teacher and Interventionist, Angie Byrne invited her friend, Pam Crooks to speak to the class. Pam is a vocational rehabilitation teacher for the visually impaired. She works at the Bureau of Services for Blind Persons (BSBP) training center, and brought one of her students, Roger Gadawski, to

speak to the class.

Pam first talked about how each case of visual impairment is different: some people see more, less, or differently than others. Roger told the class he began losing his vision when he was 12 and shared about the tools and senses he uses to navigate daily life.

He demonstrated the different types of canes he uses and how they help him detect changes in his environment.

Roger also showed them kitchen tools like a double-sided spatula, an oven glove (used to prevent burns), a liquid level sensor (a tool that you put on the side

of a cup or pitcher that will tell you when the liquid is near the top), and a cutting glove (a glove made out of steel mesh that protects your hand so you don't accidentally cut yourself).


He also showed the kids different phone apps he uses to take pictures and read print.

Pam and Roger talked about how visually impaired people can use Braille to read and write. The students received alphabet cards in Braille and pop-it cards to practice using dots to make Braille letters and numbers. The students also received bookmarks with their names in Braille.


Pam and Roger then demonstrated games that visually impaired people can play and how they adapt games so they can participate (i.e. raised dots on dice). They also shared about the importance of letting a visually impaired person know you are there by speaking up and introducing yourself. They talked about how to offer assistance to a blind person who may be struggling to find a seat, locate a room, or navigate a busy street.

It was a very informative and engaging visit that let the students see what it's like to live in someone else's shoes.
